Torrance Sailor Aboard LST 914

James L. Harner, engineman first class, husband of Mrs. Margaret Ann Harner, of 3322 Danaha street arrived in San Diego May 26 aboard the Pacific Fleet Amphibious Force tank landing ship USS LST 914, after serving for more than ten months in Korean waters.

His ship sailed to Japan last year to train elements of the Eighth Army in amphibious landings. Shortly after arriving there, the Korean conflict began and the LST 914 was launched into combat.

The ship carried assault troops and equipment from Kobe, Japan to the Inchon landing on September 15. In October, she participated in the assault landing at Wonson, and in late December the historic redeployment of United Nations troops and equipment, and North Korean refugees from the North Korean port of Hungnam.
