#### **Torrance Loses Judge in Court** Tug-of-War

With adjournment of the State legislature this week, another round in the Municipal Court battle ended with Torrane fall-ing heir to only two judges to serve this and six other com-munities in the new South Bay Municipal Court District.

The action created numerous questions about the new court set up. Here are a few of them:
Q. How will the two judges for this area be named.
A. At an election slated in June of 1952.
Q. How many judges are pres-ently serving this area?
A. Seven: Judge John A. Shiller, justice of the Peace of the Gardena Township: Otto B. Will-ett, city judge of Torrance; Elmo Fields, city judge of Gar-dena; Collamer Bridges, city judge Hermosa Beach: D. Clif-ford Higgins. Manhattan Beach; Harry W. Sturges Jr., Palos Verdes; and Sam G. Austin, Redondo Beach.
Q. Who are the most likely to be elected?
A. For one office, Judge Shid-ler-probably unoposed.

Who are the most likely to be elected? For one office, Judge Shid-let-probably unopposed. Who are candidates for the other office? Willett, Bridges, and Higgins have declared heir candidacy. Fields declared he will not run and Sturges, a new judge, and Austin are not considered po-tentially strong candidates. Why did the county only want two judges to serve this area?
