De Palma, Famed Race Driver, To Speak Here

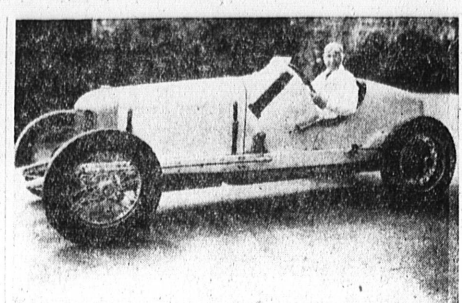
To speak before a meeting of the Torrance Rotary Club tonight is Ralph De Palma, one-time holder of the world's automobile speed record.

De Palma winner of 2557 out of 2889 races in which he competed, will speak about his racing experiences in a talk titled "Behind the Checkered Flag."

His appearance before the local service club was arranged by Dr. Raymond A. Larson, program chairman for the night.

The winner of the famous 500-mile Indianapolis classic in 1915 brings to the local scene his safety talk through the sponsorship of the General Petroleum Corporation.

Among his many racing titles is one which designates him as holder of the world's automobile speed record of 149.87 mph set at Daytona Beach, Fla. in 1919.

Optimists Hear Harbor Area Chest Leader

"Torrance's bill for services received from the Community Chest is big," according to Frank L. Miller, Harbor Area director of the Community Chest for Los Angeles.

Speaking to members of the Torrance Optimist Club here Monday evening, Miller said 18 children from Torrance are receiving treatment at the Orthopedic Hospital at the present time, and that the Community Chest is footing more than half of the bill.

He also pointed out that the Scouting program in Torrance received \$12,000 from the Chest this year, and that many other services received substantial help from the organization.

Jack Dabbs, newly announced chairman of the 1951 Chest Drive for Torrance, pointed out that \$106,000 was collected in the Harbor Area during the 1950 drive, and that services to date charged to the area total \$193,000.

"I am convinced that Torrance can be counted on to raise its share," Dabbs told the Optimist members. He emphasized that it would take the cooperation of all the service clubs and other organizations to put the drive over, however.

'Sidewinders' Give Dancing Exhibition

The wholesome enjoyment that can be had by followers of square dancing was demonstrated July 9 before the Torrance Kiwanis Club by the "Sidewinders," accomplished local square dancing group.
