

Pastor To Continue Old Testament Series

Continuing his series of sermons based on Old Testament characters, Rev. Clarence E. Miller, pastor of the First Methodist Church of Torrance, will lecture this Sunday on the theme "God Given Courage."

Rev. Miller's first sermon was on the experiences of Moses hearing the call of God to go down to Egypt. His second sermon is based on the character and experiences of Joshua.

"Modern life is filled with many hazards and man needs a courage born of God to face up to his responsibilities. This courage is available to all who will have faith in God," states Rev. Miller.

To continue during the summer months are the regular schedule of services at the church, 21 Prado and Marine avenues. The church school begins at 9:30 a.m. with the morning worship service starting at 10:30 o'clock.

Former German Pastor to Speak

Dr. H. W. Falk, formerly of Frankfurt, Germany, will preach at First Lutheran Church Sunday, July 29, at both the 8:15 and the 10:45 services. He will also speak to the adult and youth classes during the Sunday School period.

Dr. Falk was pastor of one of the largest churches in Germany with a membership of 6000. In 1930 he was an exchange student to the United States when he met his American wife. He was forced to flee from his church at the opening of World War II during the persecution of the Christians. At the end of the war he came to the United States and he is continuing his studies here. Many will remember him as the speaker at the city-wide Reformation service in Torrance last October.

Truth is CS. Theme Sunday

The spiritual significance of the city foursquare whose gates "shall not be shut at any day; for there shall be no night there" (Rev. 21:25) is considered in the Sunday Bible Lesson on "Truth" in all Christian Science churches.

The Golden Text is from Isaiah (26:1, 2): "We have a strong city; salvation will God appoint for walls and bulwarks. Open ye the gates, that the righteous nation which keepeth the truth may enter in."

In a Scriptural citation John writes, "And I John saw the holy city, new Jerusalem, coming down from God out of heaven. . . . And . . . the glory of God did lighten it, and the Lamb is the light thereof. . . . And there shall in no wise enter into it any thing that defileth. . . . or maketh a lie; but they which are written in the Lamb's book of life" (Rev. 21:2, 23, 27).

Mary Baker Eddy says in "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures": "This ministry of Truth, this message from divine Love, carried John away in spirit. It exalted him till he became conscious of the spiritual facts of being and the 'New Jerusalem, coming down from God, out of heaven'—the spiritual outpouring of bliss and glory, which he describes as the city which 'lieth foursquare' (p. 574).

Church Council Renews Efforts To Attract More Local Interest

Spurred by the fact that only 16 per cent of the population of Torrance is active in church activities, the newly-elected officers of the Torrance Council of Churches this week renewed their efforts to get the churches and the church people of this community working together.

Heading the effort is Rev. Paul Wenske, pastor of the First Lutheran Church, president of the Council. He has the support of M. M. Schwab as vice president, Mrs. Elva Conrad, secretary and Don Kelley, treasurer.

One of the more important undertakings of the council is to get more of the people in our community to go to church and to support the work of our churches financially and otherwise," Rev. Wenske said. "One of the great freedoms which we enjoy in America is the freedom of worship. This freedom is not to be interpreted as freedom from worship, but rather freedom to worship. In America today we are still free to worship God. There is no one preventing us from going to church as is the case in Russia and many other countries. In America too many people are themselves from going to church and worshipping God. The Bible tells us: 'Hold fast that which thou hast.' We have freedom of worship, we ought to hold fast to it," said the council president.

"We, as members of the Church Council, urge you to go to church. Many people of our community go to churches in other communities." We would urge that, if possible, you would make one of the churches of our community, your home church."

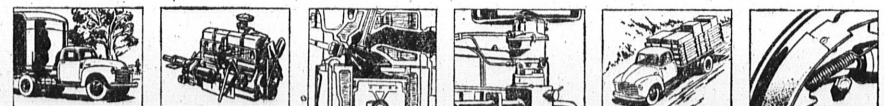

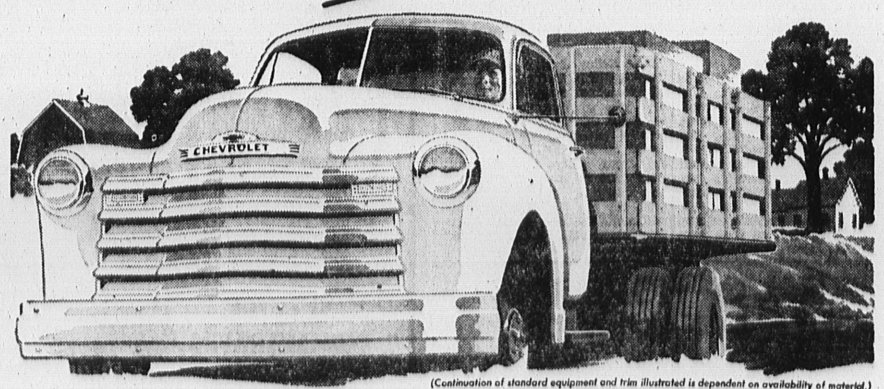
