Council Briefs

Among the matters acted upon by the Torrance City Council Tuesday night were these:

REFUSE CHARGE OKAY
Heard a letter read from the Torrance Recreation Commission expressing approval of a plan to levy a refuse collection charge for the purpose of financing recreation in Torrance.

STUDY 'BLACK CORNER'
Filed a letter from the State Highway Commission, stating that City Manager George Stevens' request for an investigation of the Newton street and highway 101 intersection be acted at once had been placed in the hands of the Traffic Control Division of the state agency.

LOCAL MAN LOSES MOTHER IN CRASH; INQUEST ORDERED
A coroner's jury will convene this afternoon at the Stone and Myers Mortuary to inquire into the death of Mrs. Eva Sampson, mother of Earl Sampson, 3108 Winlock drive.

RESIGNATION DELAYED
Referred to an agenda meeting the resignation of Tom Babbitt from the Recreation Commission. Babbitt, in a letter by proposal to the council, said he was yielding his seat on the commission to someone he felt might be in better position to promote more athletic activities for the youth of the community.

TO DISCUSS WATER
Were reminded by City Manager Stevens that the council was to meet at 5:30 p.m. Wednesday to discuss the proposed water bond issue. Referred to the meeting also was a discussion of salaries of city employees. Councilman Dale in stating that a city employee while being promoted often took a salary cut was corrected by City Manager Stevens who said that in no case was this true. Dale favors the elimination of the present five-step plan—a proposal that was to have been discussed at last evening's meeting.

UNIFORM BUS DISCOUNT
Accepted a recommendation of Marshall A. Chamberlain, Bus Department manager, that all 10-ride bus tickets be reduced to a flat 10 per cent discount on all lines.

CONTRACT TO BE DROPPED
After hearing a request from City Attorney James M. Hall, that he be granted permission to delete any reference in the resolution pertaining to the salary increase recently granted the city manager, the council okayed the attorney's request. The three year contract clause had been suggested by Stevens so that the city might have something a little more tangible than a "gentleman's agreement" that he would not seek another salary raise within three years.

WORKERS HIRED
Okayed the employment of John R. Atkinson as a construction inspector, Joan Lovelady as a typist-clerk in the fire department, Winfred E. Lawson as an assistant plumbing inspector, George K. Clemens and James R. Brown as laborers in the street department, and Earl H. Brookes and Lloyd W. Hughes as bus attendants.
