Returning this week from the Junior Red Cross training camp at Camp Seeley in Crestline, were three officers of the Torrance High School chapter of the organization.

Attending the week-long sessions were Roger Wright, president, Lorita Shellman, treasurer, and Donald Fichtner, chairman of the gift box drive. Each will hold office during the fall semester at Torrance High.

Included in the training courses presented at Camp Seeley, according to Wright, were instructions in home nursing, water safety, leadership training, civil defense training, and Junior Red Cross Production. The latter is a special project of the organization and includes the manufacture of items for hospitalized persons.

For recreation the 175 High School students attending the camp participated in swimming, ping-pong, tennis, badminton, baseball, and other camp activities.

While there, the young campers contributed \$113 to the emergency flood relief drive conducted by the Red Cross in a 30-minute collection.

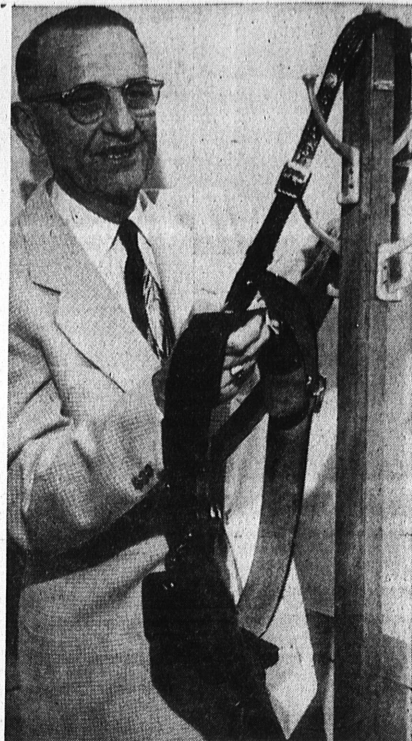
As Escobar darted out the police station through the up-town alleys during his escape he was chased by three Torrance officers, one of whom, Ralph Walker, fired two shots at the fleeing escapee. It was first thought that Escobar might have been wounded during the gunplay. He showed no wound marks, however.

When apprehended Escobar was carrying a straight edge razor but no gun. Police did not book him on a carrying a concealed weapon charge because he did not attempt to use the instrument as a weapon.

"There's no law against carrying a razor," Chief John Strohm said, "but using one for a weapon is something else again."

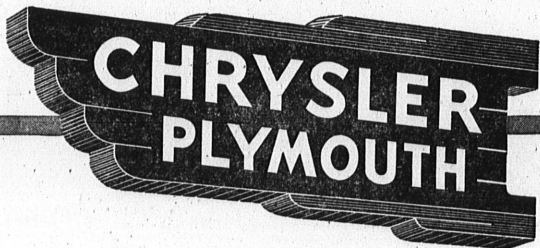

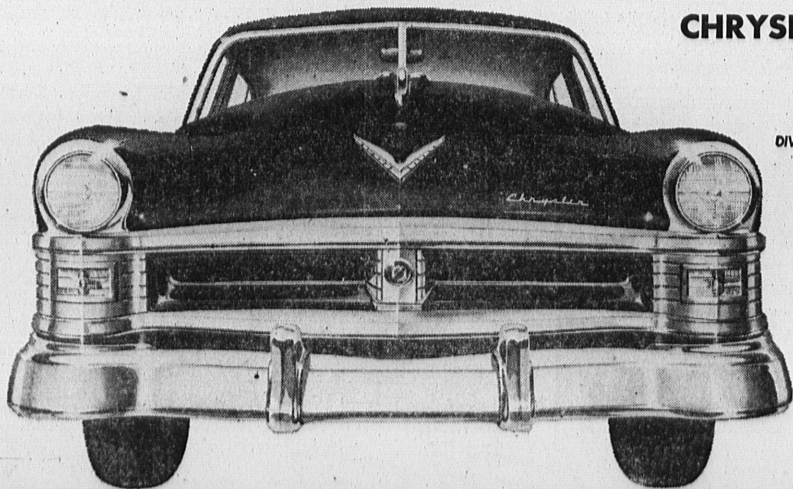

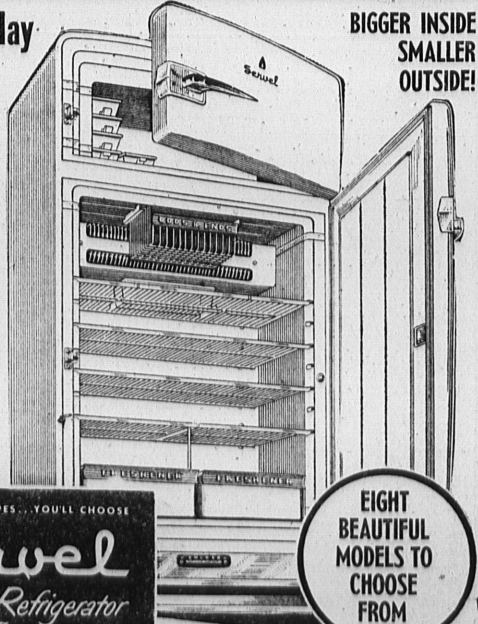
