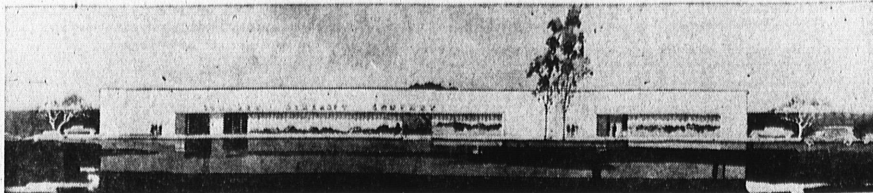
The association, open to any resident of the Shoestring Strip, meets on the fourth Tuesday of each month in the Nazarene Church on Carson street.

\$150,000 Plan Will Fence-in Longren Plant

To be launched soon is a beautification and "fencing-in" program by officials of the Longren Aircraft Company on Carson street.

The \$150,000 undertaking by the concern now filling mobilization contracts for four major airplane manufacturers, would result in a front being erected along the Carson street side of the plant. Present architectural drawings of the proposed development show the use of modern styling - with louvers, flutes, glass doors, flagstone, and shrubbery.
