Due at Selective Service headquarters by August 20, the grade rankings are to be used by the draft boards to determine eligibility for post-ponement of military service.

Both the selective service qualification test taken by most local college men of draft age and the rank certificates are to be used by draft boards. Selective Service headquarters urges all eligible men to request a certificate of rank early enough to reach their draft boards by August 20.
