Courses Offered For Petroleum Engineers by SC

Five courses designed for the professional petroleum engineer are announced by University College, evening division of the University of Southern California, beginning with the fall term on September 17.

Scheduled weekly during the 18-week term, each two-hour class offers college credit and is of advanced standing, according to Dean Carl Hancey.

Subsurface methods, a course dealing with data from cores, electric logging, and a study of construction of structural thickness, will be given Wednesdays at 7 p.m. by Henry Killian, head of the geology department, Oil Properties Consultants, Inc.

DRILLING CLASS
Drilling and technology is another class subject on Tuesdays featuring colloidal properties of drilling fluids and test procedures. It will be taught by D. H. Larsen, Baroid Sales Division, National Lead Company.

Two classes by N. Van Wingen, vice-president of Petroleum Technologists, Inc., include a study of petroleum reservoir engineering and a class on advanced oil and gas property valuation the former at 8 p.m. and the latter at 8 p.m. on Mondays.

The principles of well logging by electrical measurements and radio activity is a fifth class, scheduled for Thursdays, to be given by Loy Charter of Shell Oil Co.
