



**OVER 4 MILES OF WIRE IN A JET FIGHTER**—Assembling the complicated electrical system of a modern jet fighter like the F-86 *Sabre* would seem to call for highly-skilled technicians. However, North American has simplified the job by organizing it into separate, small sections and by using assembly jigs, color-coded wires and easy-to-follow instructions. Thus, by improved systems, North American is constantly making difficult tasks easier.



TOUGH TREATMENT MAKES RUGGED PLANES—Sparks fly from a strong steel hydraulic cylinder being fashioned for a North American T-28 Trainer landing gear. Such elements of an airplane must be extra rugged to absorb impacts of student training. Like many plane parts, this cylinder is produced by one of North American's 4,600 suppliers.
