Employment Manager Recommends Small Business Show at Fair

Torrance area residents engaged in small business will find the "Aids to Small Business Show" at the 1951 California State Fair at Sacramento August 30 through September 9 of exceptional interest. Winona Ellis, manager of the Torrance office of the California Department of Employment, said yesterday.

"This year's Small Business Show," Mrs. Ellis said, "will emphasize managerial techniques which will enable California small business to make its maximum contribution to the defense economy." The show will be conducted in the Little Theater, Governor's Hall at the fairgrounds.

Officials from the National Production Authority and the Office of Price Stabilization and other experts will be present to provide personal counseling from 1 to 5 p.m. daily through September 7.


In addition to counseling which will be available, exhibits will show how their sponsors have used facilities and resources native to various California areas to develop successful enterprises which contribute to local economies and which, in many instances, can convert to defense production in the national interest. Mrs. Ellis said. Each morning, the bureau of business education of the state department of education will conduct sales training clinics.

The show will end with a working conference to foster the development of self-employment, scheduled for 10-15 a.m., Saturday, September 8.
