Redondo Citizen Since 1888 Dies at Age 86

A resident of Redondo Beach since 1888, George Cate, 207 North Catalina avenue, was interred at Evergreen Cemetery, Los Angeles, last week.

Cate, who was 86, served as the first city treasurer of Redondo Beach, a position which he held for nearly a quarter of a century. Later, he was elected Mayor, and served in that position for eight years.

In 1895, he established the town's first Mortuary, which is still in operation today, under the ownership of Sherkey and Myers. Funeral services were conducted in the Sherkey and Myers Chapel.

The Rev. C. T. Walberg of the Redondo Beach Congregational Church, presided. Survivors include Mrs. Mable Cate, wife, a step-daughter, Mrs. E. B. Jackson, and a nephew, Dr. Loren Sims, of Redondo, and three sisters.

Salvation Army Thrift Store To Open Here Next September 7

An extensive stock of completely reconditioned articles will be offered at low cost in the new Thrift Store which the Salvation Army is establishing in Torrance at 1610 Cabrillo avenue.

The new store will be opened Friday, Sept. 7 according to Brigadier Ransom D. Gifford, Salvation Army area manager. The opening will be marked by ceremonies to be attended by Brigadier Gifford, his staff and civic officials.

The store has been thoroughly redecorated and new fixtures are being installed. It contains approximately 2200 square feet of space.

Proceeds from sales of articles will go to provide housing, food, lodging and financial assistance to men who are unable to find employment in private industry because of their handicaps, Brigadier Gifford said.

The Salvation Army, a strict non-profit organization, this year is observing its 71st year of unbroken service to needy and handicapped persons. The Salvation Army leader revealed that in the past 12 months the Social Service Center which serves this area provided 235,000 hours of work therapy, 52,350 wholesome meals, 20,145 beds and substantial financial assistance.

Articles offered for sale, which have been refurbished completely by handicapped men in Salvation Army workshops, include davenports and matching chairs, tiltbacks, rugs, dining room and bedroom sets, kitchen furniture, gas stoves, ice boxes, bedding, dishes, floor lamps, books and magazines, tricycles and bicycles, electrical appliances, wearing apparel, shoes and bric-a-brac.
