**Board Seeks Property Titles** 

The acquisition of four building sites for future Torrance schools was taken under advisement by the Board of Education Tuesday evening.

Located throughout the city school district, three of the parcels would be used for clementary schools and one for a high school in the North Walteria area.

Property owner Henry Nielson, 2505 West 163th street, spoke before board members protesting the possible condemnation of his farm land at 168th street, near Yukon, in North Torrance.

Nielson said that he had received offers of \$4500 per acre for his nine-acre site, and that he could not take less. He maintains a celery and cauliflower farm there and lives at the location.

The board has not paid a price exceeding some \$2000 per acre for land as yet.

Further negotiations will continue, and no price was quoted to Nielson by the board for to take action.
