

New Crenshaw Link to Open Scenic PV Area

A link of Crenshaw boulevard, the first public road leading to the crest of the Palos Verdes hills, will be opened with ceremonies scheduled for 2:30 p.m. on Thursday, Sept. 27.

It is part of the main Los Angeles area artery which will extend, by 1953, from Wilshire boulevard straight through to its terminus on the ocean at Port of the Americas.

Opening of the new thoroughfare from Palos Verdes drive, north to Crest road will provide a trans-peninsula highway, cutting through a scenic area heretofore reachable only over private roads.

Supervisor Raymond V. Darby and officials of the county road and sheriff's departments are scheduled to be present for the ribbon-cutting and road-opening ceremonies which will take place at the intersection of Crenshaw boulevard and Crest road.

The new link is composed of Crenshaw boulevard, Silver Spur and Montalosa roads, and with its opening, the Palos Verdes Corporation is deeding to Los Angeles County approximately four miles of Crest road so the public can drive across the Palos Verdes peninsula from Palos Verdes drive, north to the point where Crest meets on Palos Verdes drive, south, near Point Vicente lighthouse.
