

Local Trio Earn Doctors Degree After Passing Optometry Exam

Polishing shingles to hang out this week are three new doctors of optometry—all classmates at the Los Angeles College of Optometry.

Now, and since last Friday when the results of the State Board Examination were announced, it is Dr. Joe Bay, Dr. Robert Isaacs and Dr. Robert W. Anderson.

Dr. Isaacs, who lives at 1870 West 218th street, plans to open offices in the Cravens Medical Center about October 1.

Dr. Bay, who lives with his wife, Mrs. Nadine Bay, classified advertising manager of the Torrance Herald, at 2528 Torrance boulevard, is presently assisting Dr. Clarence Ingold in the latter's Marcelina office.

Dr. Anderson is the son of Mr. and Mrs. F. E. Anderson of Long Beach. While attending school Dr. Anderson worked part time at the Torrance Hardware where his father has been employed for a number of years. The new doctor is a veteran of 34 months of service in the Pacific. He has not decided where he will practice, as yet.

Both Dr. Bay and Dr. Isaacs are graduates of Torrance High School. The former in 1933 and the latter in 1939. Dr. Isaacs earned a life membership in the California Scholarship Federation before leaving Torrance High School to attend Compton College and later USC. He has been employed in Central Supply at the Harbor General Hospital while attending optometry college. His wife, Mrs. Marion Isaacs, is presently a Spanish teacher at Torrance High School.

After graduating from the local high school Dr. Bay spent a number of months with the Marines on more than a score of South Pacific islands with the First Marine Air Wing as a Pharmacist's Mate.

The trio was among the 138 graduates completing the new five-year course in optometry as required by California law.

'Back to School' Dance Scheduled

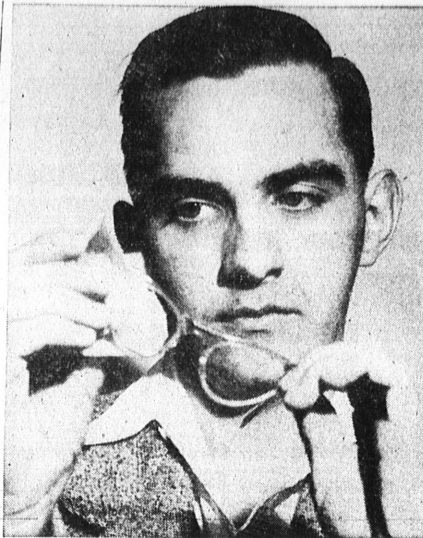

Refresher Class For Registered Nurses Offered

An eight-week refresher course for graduate nurses who wish to re-enter the active field of nursing has been announced by Harbor General Hospital to begin September 17.

Classes will be conducted four hours a day, five days a week and the applicants may work an additional four hours each day while attending classes, officials said.

The program has been established to aid in recruiting nurses to alleviate the nurse shortage which exists in the county. Applicants for the classes must be registered in the State of California or have registration pending.

Mrs. Frances Scott, director of nurses at the hospital, will interview applicants Monday through Friday between 8 a.m. and 3 p.m.

Two Guidance and Psychology Courses Offered Here by SC

Designed for the convenience of residents in the Torrance area, two special 15-week courses in guidance and psychology will be offered during the fall at Torrance High School, 2335 Plaza del Amo, and at Harbor General Hospital, 1124 West Carson street by the Community Service Division of the University of Southern California.

To be conducted by Dr. David F. Fils of the SC University College faculty and Dr. Elmer E. Wagner, associate professor in the School of Education, the guidance course will be a workshop in problems of counseling and guidance, group conferences, individual and group projects, and laboratory and field experience.

Enrollment in the course will be limited to 30 students, who must have graduate standing at the university. The class will open Monday, September 24, and will meet weekly from 7 to 10 p.m. at the high school.
