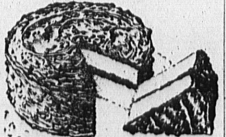

Supervisor Raymond V. Darby will snip a green and yellow ribbon this afternoon and open a public highway cutting across

The high speed road, part of which is Crenshaw boulevard, will climb to the 1000-foot crest of the Palos Verdes Hills, then

drop down to the peninsula coastal drive near Point Vicente lighthouse.
