

Fire Department to Get New Phone System in Near Future

Installation of a central switchboard with direct lines from the Torrance station to the Watteria and North Torrance engine companies, was announced this week by Fire Chief J. J. Benner.

The new system should be in operation within the next two weeks, Benner said.

When installation of the central board is complete, the city's three fire stations will have only one telephone number—a cumbersome, four-digit number. The new number will be 3126.

The old emergency number 23 and the business number 491 will be discarded as soon as the new board is in, Benner said. Persons calling the old number will automatically get the central switchboard.

Chief Benner reminded persons calling the department from dial phones or from phones

with other than the Torrance exchange that they must ask for "The Torrance Fire Department." Persons calling from Long Beach, Torrance, or Terminal numbers and asking for the fire department will not get Torrance, he warned. Switchboard operators will be trained among members of the department, Benner said. The man on watch will operate the board. In time, every man in the department will be able to handle the phone board, the Chief said.
