

Torrance Viewpoint Topic For PTA Unit's First Meet

The Torrance Point of View was the subject of a talk delivered by Dr. J. H. Hull before a large gathering last Thursday evening in the Fern Avenue cafeteria. The occasion was the October meeting of the Fern Avenue-Greenwood School PTA. Dr. Hull said that language arts would be stressed in the Torrance schools this year. It is the aim of the schools to treat each child as an individual; to help him to grow emotionally, mentally, socially and physically. The schools will strive for home, school and church teamwork in achieving this.

He stated that four years ago, when Torrance formed its own school district, the enrollment figure was 1900. "Today," he said, "it has reached 5555." Dr. Hull added that it was the greatest increase in any district in the state and that the community is still growing with a need for more schools.

The meeting was opened by a salute to the flag led by Cub Scouts from Den 3 of Pack 728. The Rev. Paul Wensie of the First Lutheran Church gave the inspirational message.

During the business session, presided over by Mrs. G. G. Grubb, PTA president, a change was made in the by-laws making the official name of the organization the Fern Avenue-Greenwood School PTA. It will

be known as such until the Greenwood School decides to form a unit of its own. At this time Mrs. Grubb was presented a president's pin and a corsage by Mrs. G. J. Derouin, past president.

Mr. C. I. Creelius, Fern Avenue principal and Mr. R. F. Ellerman, principal of Greenwood School, introduced their respective faculties.

Mr. P. E. Humphreys, Cubmaster of Pack 728, which is sponsored by the PTA, invited the members to attend the October Pack meeting. It will be held in the Fern Avenue cafeteria on October 26 at 7:30 p.m. The organization will be presented with its new charter at that time. All boys between the ages of eight and eleven who wish to become Cub Scouts may join the Pack that evening. They must be accompanied by their parents.

Mrs. Robert Lenton, president, led the group in a discussion of interesting plans of forthcoming club activities.

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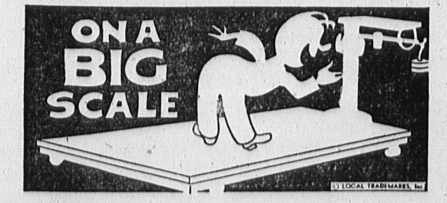
