Representing the Torrance Junior Woman's Club were Mrs. C. E. Wallace, president, and Mrs. K. L. McGreen, federation coordinator.

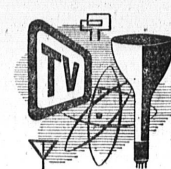
Featured topic of the evening was the district philanthropic project. This year the membership has voted to make their donation to the Muscular Dystrophy Research Laboratory.
