## SPASTIC MUSCLE and PAIN



In my practice I have noticed that wherever there is pain, there is muscle involvement. This is always true with muscular pain. There is often no apparent reason for the pain and the patient can't remember any incident that would have produced the soreness.

The spastic (contracted) tissue is often so sore that the patient cannot bear to have it touched. After a few minutes of delicate manipulation along the nerve pathways, relaxation begins to be apparent. It is then possible to manipulate deeply and break-up the area of spastic tissue which has been causing the mischief.

The spastic tissue sometimes blocks the flow of nerve force, circulation of the blood, etc. This vicious circle is due to the rigid contraction of the spastic muscle.

My spastic tissue technique often produces such dramatic results that the patient is hardly aware relief has been achieved until they notice that the pain is gone and they happily exclaim, "It doesn't hurt anymore."

If you have tried "everything" without relief, perhaps my methods may be the answer to your problem.

## Whole Blood Urgent Need, Donate Now!

Los Angeles Blood Center this week received another another hurry-up request for whole blood to be shipped to Korea. The number of pints asked for was not disclosed, but Mrs. H. B. K. Willis, blood donor recruitment chairman, said that it was the largest single shipment requested since the Korea war began—indicative of the heavy fighting now in progress.

Mrs. Clifford Easley, Torrance branch blood donor recruitment chairman, urged persons who can contribute to call DUNKIRK 4-5261, Extension 270 or drop in at 925 South Western Avenue to contribute a pint of blood. A bloodmobile unit will be in Torrance on December 3 when, it is hoped, many more pints of blood can be added for our fighting boys. Plasma, too, is every bit as important as whole blood. If a wounded GI doesn't get shock-fighting plasma on the battlefield, he'll not stay alive long enough to be transported to rear areas where life-saving whole blood is available.
