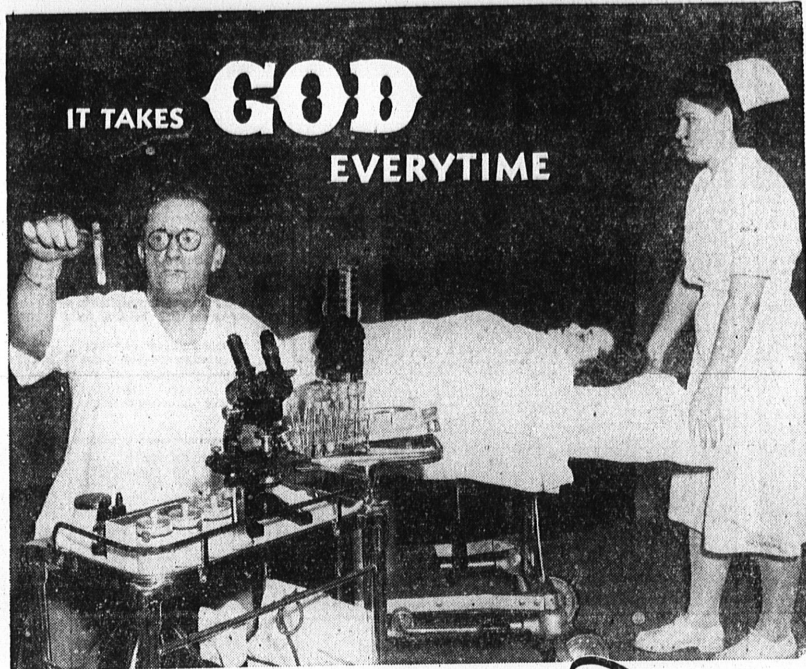

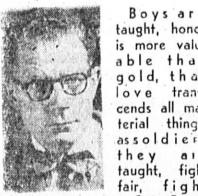

An American Trait Pays Off



Boys are taught, honor is more valuable than gold, that love transcends all material things; as soldiers they are taught, fight hard and win. Sgt. Paul Hirschheimer, of San Gabriel, had these truths instilled in his mind and when fighting was most vicious, when a Jap anywhere, was a fair target, this young man found some crumpled scraps of paper, with writing on them, and a memento in the pocket of a dead enemy soldier. He brought them home.

When Paul was recalled for duty in Japan, he found the family of the dead soldier and gave them his mementos. Those one-time enemies could not believe there were people in the world who would forgive, who had compassion. Differences of religious concept dissolved, differences of political philosophy evaporated; this white boy and their son were brothers. They were ready to trust Americans if they were like this soldier; his religion taught him Brotherly Love and they wanted it.

Honor, love and kindness did a better job of cementing a lasting friendship between us and that Japanese family than all the political maneuvering ever conceived. Sgt. Paul Hirschheimer sold American ideals.
