Randall climaxed his recruit
training by winning the mark-
smanship medal on the rifle range

pistol, carbine, and Browning
automatic rifle. He also wit-

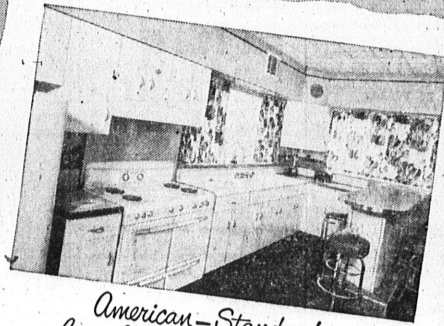

to work here with them."



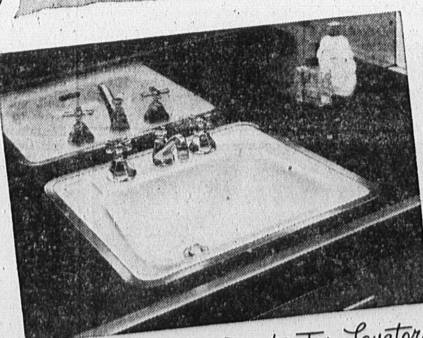
American-Standard buys kitchen cabinet firm
