Classroom Demonstrations Feature PTA Evening Meet

In recognition of American Education Week, currently being observed, two grades at Fern Avenue School held classroom demonstrations at Thursday's meeting of Fern Avenue-Greenwood PTA. Mrs. Gerald G. Grubb, president, conducted the session in the new cafeteria.

Scout Troop 698, one of four Scout groups sponsored by the PTA, led the flag salute.

Miss Margaret Lawrence's third grade presented a typical classroom discussion. They have been studying a unit on the Post Office which integrated social studies and language arts. They wrote letters to friends and relatives in various cities and states and learned where these states are in relation to Torrance and what methods of transportation are used in carrying letters from one community to another. They will visit Torrance Post Office in the near future to learn what happens there before a letter or package begins its journey to its destination.

An art demonstration was offered by Mr. Howard Huizing's fourth grade class. As two students constructed a simple cube on the board, the teacher explained that the cube was the basis for the series of completed drawings shown by each of the children. Individuality in color and design was evident as the students presented their interesting drawings for inspection. Free hand map drawings

of California, showing the various elevations in color, were included in the demonstration.

Mrs. A. K. Krauszer, membership chairman, reported a total of 821 members with 565 women and 256 men. C. I. Creelius, and R. F. Ellerman, principals of the two schools, expressed pleasure in the attendance. Mr. Creelius invited parents to visit the cafeteria any day during lunch period, to observe. Mr. Ellerman expressed pleasure over the results of the recent group conferences. With an enrollment of 351 students at Greenwood School, 200 parents attend the conferences.

A successful food sale was held during the evening meeting by mothers of Mrs. Edna Wright's kindergartners. Under direction of Mrs. Ralph F. King, approximately \$45 was realized from the sale and will be used to buy a child-size divan and chair for the kindergarten. The proceeds, in addition, will buy several other items for the classroom.

Refreshments were served after the meeting with room mothers of the kindergarten as hostesses.

AUXILIARY SETS GOAL FOR MEMBER CAMPAIGN

One million members enrolled for service to America and America's war veterans will be the goal of the American Legion Auxiliary in its 1952 membership campaign. Mrs. Mary Toombs, president of the Torrance Unit of the Auxiliary, announced today as she completed plans for the local part of the national membership effort.

During November eligible women of the community are being invited to come into the organization and be ready to take part in the activities of 1952.

"Already the largest woman's organization of its kind in the world, the Auxiliary hopes to be even larger next year because of the increased need for the work it is doing," said Mrs. Toombs. "For several years we have had a membership of almost one million women and in 1952 we are expecting to exceed that number."

"Eligible for membership," Mrs. Toombs explained, "are wives, mothers, sisters and daughters of members of The American Legion and those persons who gave their lives in the World Wars or the Korean conflict, or who have died since honorable discharge from war service. Women who themselves were regularly enrolled in the armed forces during wartime are eligible to membership in both the Legion and Auxiliary."

"The Auxiliary offers these women an opportunity to carry on the type of patriotic service 16th and Leland streets."

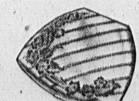
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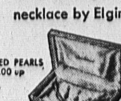
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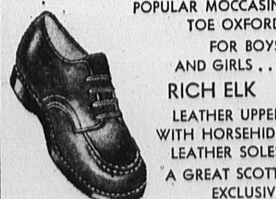
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
