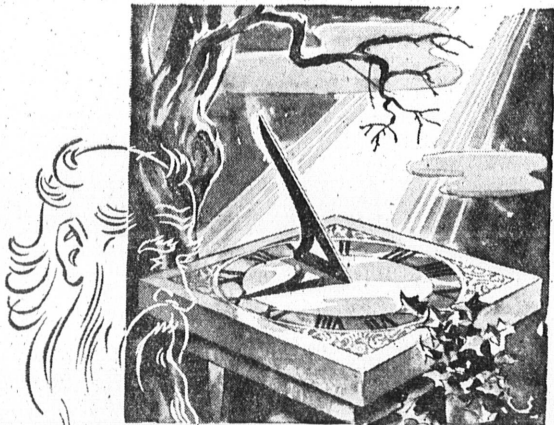

The family moved here from Long Beach.

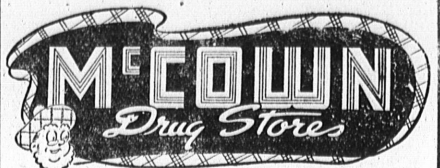
Three Schools Schedule Diphtheria Immunizations

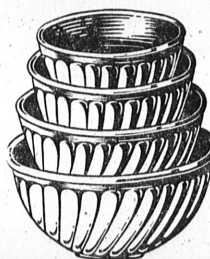

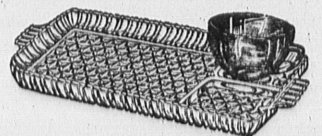
