The couple was married on November 11 in Quartzsite, Arizona, then flew to Paris, France, where they were remarried in the Notre Dame Cathedral on Thanksgiving Day.

Following the announcement in the Herald on November 28, papers and wire services across the nation picked up the story as a wedding of "Cinderella and her Prince Charming," and followed the couple with considerable interest.

On Dec. 3, Martha, through a San Francisco attorney, sued her husband of three weeks for separate maintenance.
Once again, the story flared into headlines across the nation as newspapers large and small began telling their readers that the Cinderella marriage was PFFFT.

Meanwhile, at the Morris home, at 1429 West 215th street, parents of the young bride were getting less and less sleep as reporters from Los Angeles area papers and wire services converged on the family home seeking details of the separation.

The return of Martha to her parents' home last week was duly observed by the press of the nation, and the story was allowed to simmer down... until yesterday.

Reports that the couple had left on their "second" honeymoon in the same powder blue Cadillac in which they traveled to Quartzsite for their first wedding brought the Southland's newsmen back on the scene.

Destination of the couple is unknown, but sources close to the family say they are "out of the state."

Torrance residents can expect to get reports again from friends and relatives "back home," that the Cinderella story is again being read across the nation. Perhaps this story will have a happier ending.
