## SC to Offer Special Night Classes Here

Planned as a service for residents in the Torrance area, two special courses in education and psychology will be offered during the spring semester at Torrance High School and at Harbor General Hospital by the community service division of the University of Southern California.

Under the direction of Dr. Adele Grant, Southern California University College lecturer, the education class offered is teaching science in the elementary school. It covers methods and materials used in teaching science in elementary grades and

gives demonstration experiments adapted to elementary classroom work.

The class will begin February 13 and will meet weekly on Wednesdays from 4 to 6 p.m. in room 114 of the high school science building, 2209 Carson street. Two units of credit will be offered and registration will be held at the first meeting.

Instructor for the courses titled survey of clinical psychology, will be Dr. Frank Risch, clinical psychologist. The class deals with the interpretation of measures of intelligence, interests and special abilities, standard diagnostic techniques and counseling and therapy in schools, courts, clinics and prisons. Prerequisites for the class is psychology 490.

Beginning February 14, the class will meet weekly on Thursdays from 7 to 10 p.m. in building A-5 at the hospital, 1121 West Carson street. Three units of credit will be offered.

## Police Department Spends Busy Year

Torrance police officers spent a busy year in 1951, according to statistics compiled by Mrs. Carol Wright, police matron and record clerk.

Practically every phase of police work increased during the year as compared to the previous two years, the report shows. Strangely enough, however, fewer persons were arrested for violation of road and driving laws than in either of the two previous years.

The report also shows that police cars were driven a total of 221,431 miles during 1951 as compared to 180,562 in 1950 and 179,816 miles in 1949. Similar increases are shown in nearly all other parts of the report.

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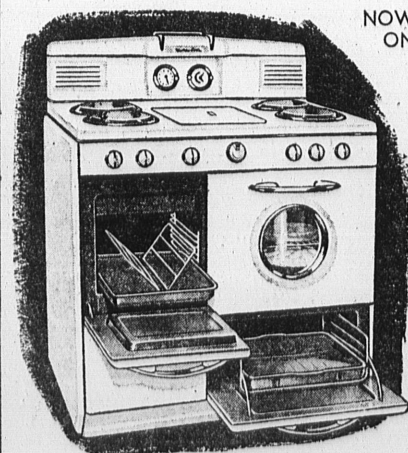
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
