Correct Name Brings Fire Rigs Hustling

Name your community when you call the fire department. That was the advice given this week by officials of the Los Angeles Fire Department, beamed at those who reside in the Shoestring Strip or who live in the surrounding areas.

Anyone can assure himself of prompt and efficient service from the fire department by knowing the city in which he lives and by giving this information to the department.

"To report a fire, ask the operator for the fire fighting force that serves your community, or dial 116 and ask for the correct department," officials said.

"If you live in the Strip, ask the operator for the Los Angeles Fire Department; if in the City of Torrance, in the Torrance department, and in the County, for the County Fire Department."

Once you have been connected with the fire department, tell the firemen your correct address—street, avenue, lane or place; also, tell them what is burning.
