Services were conducted in Long Beach yesterday for Mrs. Julia A. Baldwin, 86, grandmother of Jack C. Baldwin, assistant to the publisher of the Torrance Herald.

Mrs. Baldwin died early Sunday morning at the home of her only other grandchild, Mrs. Jane Williams, in Bakersfield. The deceased's remains were brought to Long Beach Tuesday by Holton and Sons Funeral Home, where the final rites were conducted by the Macca-bees.

Surviving are her son, Don G. Baldwin, superintendent of the Grease and Lubricating Plant of the General Petroleum Corporation, and a daughter, Clara B. York, of Bakersfield.

The deceased had long been active in the Order of Eastern Star of Long Beach, where she had lived for more than 20 years. Interment was in Inglewood Cemetery.

Hermosa City Judge Enters Court Race

An announcement that he will seek election to the Judicial Bench of the new South Bay Judicial District was made today by Judge Collamer A. Bridge of Hermosa Beach.

"Since it is not necessary to indicate which of the two of us I will file for until Feb. 29, final decision will be made at that time," he said.

Judge Bridge said friends from various areas in the new Judicial District had been urging him to seek office No. 1.

"I will sincerely consider their advice in the final decision on Feb. 29 as to whether I will seek Office No. 1 or No. 2," he stated.

The City Judge of Hermosa Beach for the past 24 years, Judge Bridge said he would seek election to the office on a basis of his qualifications and record of legal service in the South Bay area.

In addition to his experience as City Judge of Hermosa, Judge Bridge has served over a period of years as a visiting municipal judge in most of the cities of the South Bay including Torrance, Redondo, Gardena, Manhattan Beach, Inglewood, Hawthorne, and Palos Verdes. He also served as visiting jurist in the Los Angeles Municipal Courts.

The jurist has lived in Hermosa since 1920, and has been practicing law in California for 39 years since receiving his law degree from the University of Southern California.

He has been a member of the Board of Trustees of the Hermosa Beach City School District for 27 years. He has two children, Richard W. Bridge and Barbara Elaine—now Mrs. D. R. Weaver. Both of Judge Bridge's children and his four grandchildren live in the South Bay area.

The judge is past president of the Los Angeles County School Trustees' Assoc., and one of the organizers of the California State School Trustees' Assoc. He is past Exalted Ruler of the Redondo Beach Elks, and was president of the Hermosa Beach Chamber of Commerce for two terms. He is past president of the Hermosa Kiwanis Club, a member of the Masonic Order, past patron of the Order of Eastern Star, and a member of the California State and National Bar Association.

"It would be a great honor indeed to serve on the first municipal bench of our new South Bay Judicial District," Judge Bridge said yesterday as he prepared to file his official notice of intention to be candidate for the office.
