A new cycle of informal dining was introduced in 1914 when the first cafeteria opened in Los Angeles.

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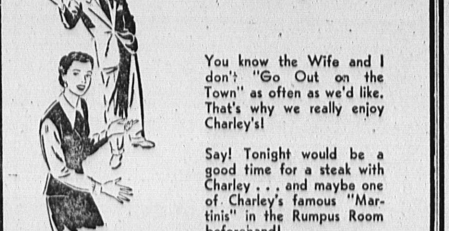
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
