Red Shield Serves Many, Report Shows

Salvation Army's red shield trucks from the Social Service Center serving this area traveled a distance equal to nearly 12 times around the earth and collected more than five million pounds of salvage materials in 1951. Brig. Gifford, D. Gifford, manager, revealed this week in his annual report.

Brig. Gifford said the trucks covered 292,000 miles in picking up 5,205,250 pounds of castoff articles. Processing of the throw-away materials in the Center's workshops provided 235,000 hours of occupational therapy for needy and handicapped men.

Workers processed and repaired 221,000 garments and 32,680 pairs of shoes as well as repairing and finishing 18,750 pieces of furniture. They also handled 150,000 miscellaneous articles.

The Center gave emergency and short-time aid to 2210 persons and admitted another 410. It provided 55,380 meals and 20,145 beds.

Brig. Gifford urged local residents to continue their donations of discards so the Salvation Army can carry on its social rehabilitation program. A call to Torrance 3634 will bring a truck to home or office.

Needed materials include clothing, shoes, furniture, bedding, rugs, dishes, stoves, books and rags, Brig. Gifford said.
