

BULLETS MISS DEPUTIES ON PV 'TARGET RANGE'

Government postal inspectors today were studying "The Mystery of the Palos Verdes Mail Bag."

A badly-deteriorated leather and canvas pouch of the type used to carry registered mail or bank funds was found hidden under a large rock atop the nearby hills.

Its lock was still secure but the sides of the bag apparently had been slit by a knife. It appeared to have been pierced with a .38 caliber bullet.

Measuring 18 by 14 inches, the postal container was found near Marymount School in Rolling Hills by men removing native stone.

Printing on the leather work spells out the manufacturing stamp, "William H. Hoegge, Los Angeles." Scratched into the leather are the words "Stor No. 4" and "Ford Spot." There are illegible blue crayon markings on the canvas portion.

The bag was turned over to Mrs. Lillian Throne, postmaster of Palos Verdes Estates, who got in touch with postal inspectors in Long Beach. Mrs. Throne said the bag was of the kind normally used to carry bank funds.

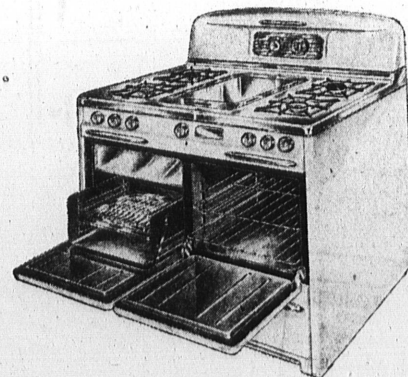

Douglas Still Holding Option On Alcoa Plant

Douglas Aircraft officials have made no decision yet about leasing the huge Columbia Steel property formerly occupied by Alcoa, a company spokesman told the Herald yesterday afternoon.

The huge aircraft company announced recently that it had taken an option to lease the manufacturing site located at 190th St. and Normandie Ave. Reports prevalent here at the time of the announcement said Douglas planned to set up an assembly plant here which would eventually hire about 5000 persons. Company officials have made no official comment on plans for the plant.

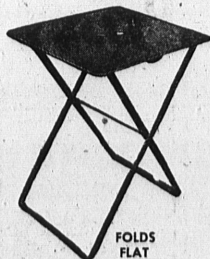

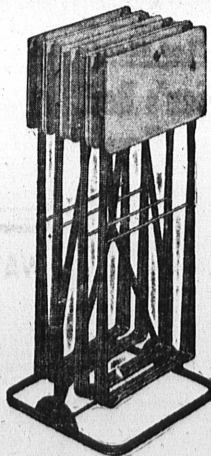

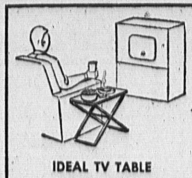
