Unincorporated Area Begins Plans for Civil Defense Work

Civil defense strategy for the unincorporated area was mapped at a meeting of the Medical Division Friday afternoon in the offices of Dr. Harold S. Johnson in Long Beach. Two representatives from the Los Angeles County Health Department were keynote speakers. Dr. Johnson indicated the five casualty stations which will serve the unincorporated area in case of emergency, and stressed the need for 25 to 50 trained personnel to man each of the stations.

Training programs, under the direction of Nurse Helen Fitzgerald, will begin soon. The course has been set up by National Civil Defense Headquarters in Washington.

Mrs. M. Q. Wallace, principal of Carson St. School, pointed out that supplies and first aid kits are already on hand at the school.

Representing areas within the unincorporated area were Martha Bergman, head nurse at American Can Co., which will be one of the casualty stations; Mrs. Alma Blake from Carson St. School, another casualty station; William Holmblad, principal of Dominguez Elementary School; and Margaret Smith, principal of Catskill School.
