"Lower taxes," was Item No. 1. Karlow has been employed there 16 years. He is one of five independent candidates vying for the office of city councilman. Three other men, known as the TUT ticket, are running together as a three-man team.  
Realizing the voters of this community would be interested in Karlow's stand on a number of local problems, the Herald compiled him with the following questions:  
Q. What are some of your plans for improving the operation of the city?  
A. I have in mind three projects. First, I would undertake to publish an annual report to the residents of the city. This would be mailed to the citizens outlining what is planned and what has been done. In the report would be covered financial reports, street development, flood control, recreation expenditures, capital improvements, and other matters of interest to the citizens.  
"Secondly, I am in favor of appointing a planning commission investigator or delegating some member of a municipal department to enforce sections of the land use ordinance and if necessary to make arrests where violations of variances are detected.  
"Thirdly, I would favor and foster the instigation of a 'pop-up system' on matters referred to the various departments, commissions, and even to the council itself. I feel a system is needed to prevent matters from dying on the vine or being lost in committee. Too often matters brought before the council are forgotten in the very maze of

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reports, requests, and demands brought before the council.  
Q. Would you air your views on city taxes?  
A. I am for adhering to the hold-the-line policy on taxes. With the city growing as rapidly as it is, I do not feel we can trim the amount of services needed by the residents. If the council considers trimming the budget, it is bound to look for the most expensive item. That would be wages, since 70 per cent of last year's budget was for salaries. We cannot cut the wages of city employees and expect to retain the high type personnel now employed or remain in the competitive labor market.  
To hold-the-line on taxes we must operate the city as a business. The budget must be free of "political favors." The money must be spent intelligently and judiciously.  
Q. What are your views on recreation?  
A. I favor some plan of "pay-as-you-go" recreation—with a long range objective in mind. I believe we must act now if the city is to acquire future neighborhood park sites at low cost. Each day brings an increase in the price of land."  
Q. If the council should receive a request to open up the city to gambling, how would you vote?  
A. "I would vote down any proposal which would open the door to gambling in Torrance—regardless of what type of gambling, be it pinball machines, one-armed bandits, bingo, keno, poker, or punchboards."  
Q. Do you have a solution to the parking problem?  
A. "However, no. However, that doesn't mean that there isn't a solution. If the business district of Torrance is to survive, one of the immediate problems that must be met and solved is the

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
