## Torrance Share Of Government Costs Listed

Cost to Torrance taxpayers for supporting the Federal Government were listed yesterday by Donald M. Maher, chief accountant of Ideco.

Commenting on figures of supporting the Federal Government compiled by the National Association of Manufacturers, Maher said the Federal grab of 80 per cent of local revenue makes it hard to provide essential local service such as schools, police and fire protection.

Torrance's share of the cost of the government has risen to \$44,400,000, he said. Of this total, \$7,204,000 has been imposed since the Korean war. Maher said Torrance residents spend \$1,509,600 as their share of the Federal payroll.

## 578th Engineers Enter First Battle, Bull Doozo Relates

While standing in the cold pre-dawn of a recent Monday morning on the back side of a jump-off point on the Korean front lines, men of D Company, 578th Engineers, shifted their 40-pound loads of death-dealing flame-throwers, and got ready.

In only a few minutes they were to accompany L Company, 224th Infantry Regiment, over the slope through a slippery, frozen pass in an assault on an enemy-held hill, honeycombed with bunkers—the first combat action by men of the 578th on bloody Korean battlefields.

Every man knew the assault plan. At the far side of a wide valley stood a tall, barren hill. On this hill were enemy bunkers which were to be destroyed. On another hill, a little higher, and to the rear of the first, were more bunkers. These were to be blasted open.

In order to maintain liaison with the infantry assault commanders, M/Sgt. Johnnie L. Pitts, of 915 Portola Ave. and 2nd Lt. Frank Savage, Lyndwood, forged forward with the infantry leaders.

Pitts, platoon sergeant of the 3rd platoon, suffered slight wounds in the action, but did not have to be dropped from duty status. Savage is platoon leader.

Tanks rumbled into the valley to support the attack by direct fire upon the Communist bunkers. Mines hidden beneath the icy ground spelled danger for the tanks — and the engineers who were riding the tanks.

The tanks were joined by two quad-fifty rifles to strengthen the fire support. Intense automatic, small arms fire and grenades fired by Communist Chinese forces menaced the advance.

Men on foot were unable to overcome the bunkers. They were pinned down. They were unable to move forward or backward.

Here, Sgt. 1/c William Schoolcraft, Seattle, was killed—the only fatality of the battle. Just as the fire ceased briefly

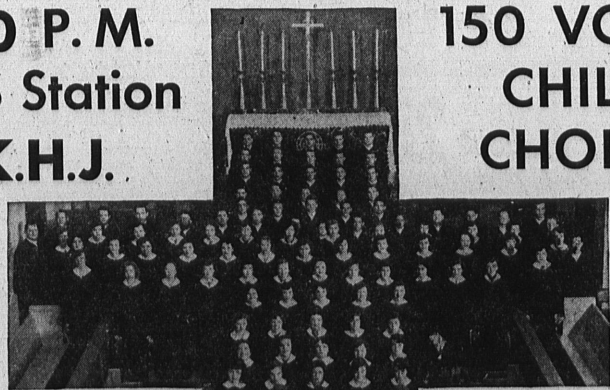
