Kenneth Zeller Named Associate Church Pastor

Selection and appointment of Rev. Kenneth P. Zeller as associate pastor of the Central Evangelical United Brethren Church here was announced this week by the pastor, Rev. Homer H. Miller. Appointment was made at the California Conference of the church in Sacramento last week.

The son of Rev. Francis A. Zeller, pastor of the Central Church here from 1921 until 1927, the new pastor will be given the responsibility of organizing and building up a new community church in North Torrance, Rev. Miller said.

First services of the new group will be held next Sunday morning at 9:30 at McMaster Hall, 174th and Yukon.

Rev. Zeller, a nephew of W. E. Bowen, 1327 Cota Ave., is married and has one daughter, now 2½ years old. The Zellers will move into 17035 Atkinson Ave. in the near future, he said.

Rev. Miller will speak to the North Torrance congregation on Sunday morning to explain the action taken by the home mission board of the California Conference relative to the assistant established for the church, he said.

Rev. Zeller attended the College of the Pacific in Stockton and the University of Southern California. He also attended the Evangelical Theological Seminary in Naperville, Ill. He is a veteran of four years service with the Navy during World War II.
