

Secretary Outlines Chamber Services

Compilation of the many services performed by the Torrance Chamber of Commerce was released this week by Dale Isenberg, executive secretary of the local Chamber, as part of the Chamber's monthly "Bulletin."

The list of services runs from answering thousands of pieces of mail each year to sponsoring special events where "Chamber prestige and/or moderate financial aid will materially aid the project," according to the report.

Some of the services offered by the local Chamber of Commerce include the following:

Committees — Work covers every department of Public Service. See list of committees. Meetings held on call by the Chairman when specific problems are to be discussed. All recommendations submitted to the Board of Directors.

Correspondence — Incoming mail, approximately 1000 pieces each month. Outgoing mail, approximately 2000 pieces.

Directories — Torrance Business directory and directories from a great number of California communities. Thomas' Register of Manufacturers, Macrae's Buyers' Guide, Poor's Register of Executives and Directors, Rand McNally's Atlas, Torrance City Land Use Map.

Folders — Large variety of folders for distribution dealing with hotels, resort areas, travel near and far, and community brochures.

Inquiries by telephone and over the counter—Approximately 1500 each month through which information is given to the public on a tremendous variety of subjects. An extensive card in-

dex file is maintained to keep the facts up to date. Special research is done when necessary to provide authentic information. This is one of the most important Chamber services to the general public.

Meetings—Board of Directors meeting, 1st and 3rd Monday 4:00 P. M. Special meetings on call. Membership meetings from time to time. Meetings of the Merchants' Division to discuss their special problems and plan programs of action. The Chamber participates actively in meetings of many other groups.

Printed Material — Monthly issue of Chamber Bulletin carrying news of the Chamber and the community. Annual edition of Shoppers Guide, condensed and indexed information on Torrance. Maps of Torrance. Industrial brochures as needed to provide up-to-date information.

Special folders to promote new industry. Mimeographed reports summarizing studies on local economic conditions. All material published by the Chamber distributed free.

Support for business interests—Intensive and well planned program on year around basis for Merchants' Division, a semi autonomous Chamber group. Many types of service rendered to local industries. All problems dealt with on the basis of their importance to community welfare.

Special Events — Sponsorship of many special events where Chamber prestige and/or moderate financial aid will materially aid the projects. Cooperation with other organizations is constantly forthcoming.

Statistics—Numerous reports prepared regarding local economic conditions. Special emphasis is on the number of businesses and professions, and indication as to whether the total in each division is sufficient to meet community needs.

The above is a condensed list of some of the standard services. Any problem of whatever kind will receive detailed study whenever it has broad community importance.
