Council Okays Site Purchase For Reservoir

Another step in the modernization of the city's water system—already nearly 90 per cent under way—was taken by the City Council Wednesday evening when it authorized purchase of an acre of land in North Torrance as a site for the 1,000,000-gallon water reservoir to be placed in that area. The land, adjacent to McMaster Park at 174th St. and Yukon, will cost \$4300. City Manager George Stevens reported to the Council. Well under way is the preliminary construction work for the 10,000,000-gallon steel and concrete reservoir in the South Torrance hills being built by the firm of Chadwick and Buchanan.
