Special School Graduates Cook

Sgt. D. C. Cook of the Torrance Police Department was one of the 17 police and juvenile officers who were graduated from the Delinquency Control Institute of the University of Southern California Friday after 12 weeks of specialized training.

Ceremonies were held at the Miramar Hotel, Santa Monica, at 8 p.m., with W. H. Hutchinson, chief of police of that city, presenting graduation certificates.

As the only training program of its kind in the nation, the institute is directed by Prof. Dan Pursuit. It is operated by contributions from the Automobile Club of Southern California, the Farmers Insurance Group, the Hollywood Turf Club Associated Charities and an anonymous donor.

Since its inception in 1946, 204 officers from 16 states and five foreign nations have been graduated from the institute. In the current class are juvenile officers from nine California municipalities and a representative of the police department of Oslo, Norway.
