

TARTAR RUNNERS WIN IN CIF PRELIMINARIES

Harriers Run Friday For First CIF Title

The Tartar cross-country team swept to an easy victory in the CIF preliminaries Friday at Mt. San Antonio College and are gunning for the first CIF championship in the history of Torrance High School.

The CIF finals will be held Friday on the Mt. Sac course. Torrance took six out of the first 17 places to win their division easily in the preliminaries. Bob Guerra placed second in a time of 10:13 for the 1.8 mile course, and Buzz Zamora took third in 10:14. Both boys received CIF medals, and the school won a CIF plaque for taking the group championship. The Tartars, originally slated to race in the same group as

powerful Bellflower High, were moved up a notch when Cantwell was placed in the Torrance group. Bellflower took first place, and will run in the finals. Scoring for the Torrance group was Torrance with 35; La Jolla, 69; Citrus, 86; Baldwin Park, 87; Santa Paula, 112; Kearny, 135; and Paramount 156.

Tartars Tom Waller, seventh; Fred Albertson, 30th; Dave Ruf, 61; 13th; and Jim Stanford, 15th, breezed in behind Guerra and Zamora. Torrance will race against winning teams in the five other CIF divisions in the finals. All first-place men, regardless of where their team finished, also race in the finals as do the two fastest second-place men and two fastest second-place teams. Thus, the Tartars will be running against seven other teams and individuals from teams that didn't place. Coach Vern Wolfe says that he is "hoping to get into the first three."

A victory for Coach Wolfe's charges would give Torrance High School its first CIF championship in any sport.

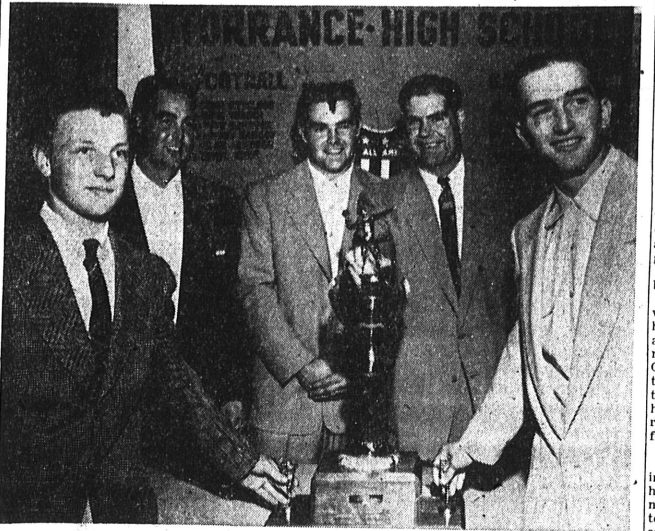

Beverly Hills, Inglewood, Santa Monica and Glendale Hoover are top-seeded teams in the field of 16 participating Southland high school cage squads.

Redondo, the defending champs, meets Glendale Hoover at 8:30 on Wednesday, the opening night, in their own gym. Other pairings are Beverly Hills vs. El Segundo, Wednesday, 2:30 p.m. at Mira Costa gym; Santa Monica vs. Paramount, Wednesday, 2:30 p.m., Redondo; Inglewood vs. Rosemead, Wednesday, 7 p.m., Mira Costa; Leuzinger vs. Silver City, 4 p.m., Mira Costa; Mira Costa vs. Baldwin Park, 8:30, Mira Costa; Morningside vs. El Rancho, 4 p.m., Redondo.

Surprise guest for the dinner was Eddie Cole, former Tartar head coach, now assistant coach at the College of Idaho and secretary of the Caldwell, Idaho, Chamber of Commerce. Cole paid tribute to the Torrance football team of 1953 by saying that, in his opinion, 1953 has been Torrance High School's greatest football year.

Cole offered all the graduating seniors sound advice when he said: "Go to college. It doesn't matter where, just go."
