Red Cross Solves Family Problem By Helping Get Furlough for Boy

The Raymond Rose family of Torrance had a problem—but the Red Cross solved it for them.

It was solved recently with the granting of an additional 90-day emergency furlough to 21-year-old Henry Rose—an operation in which the Red Cross Home Service Department workers lent a helping hand.

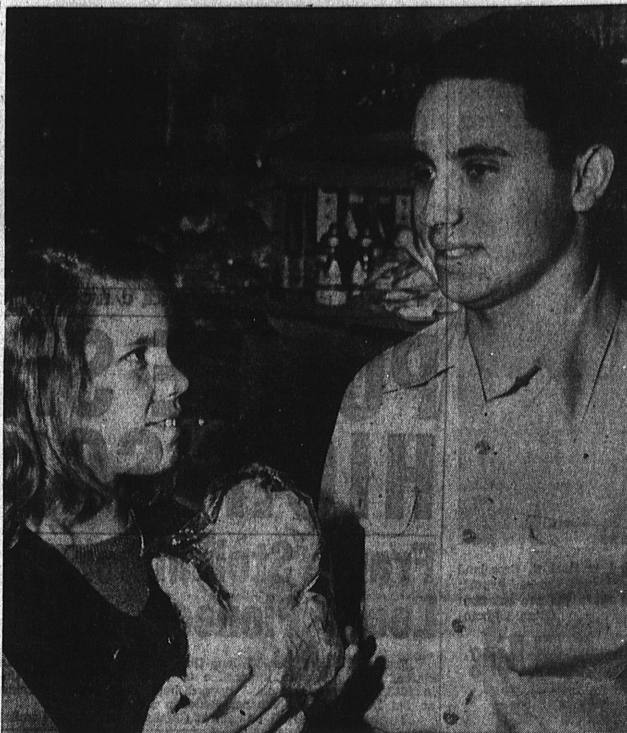
Without Henry at home, the Roses would have been forced to close up their little 5-and-10 variety store at 17277 Crenshaw Blvd.—and just when the Christmas shopping season would be

in full swing. "Our family would have been sunk without the aid given us by Red Cross," Henry said. "Mama was plenty busy getting dad into a hospital, and Red Cross stepped right in like real neighbors to give us assistance. Red Cross also had blood available for the operation."

Last month, when Henry was being ordered to Camp Stoneman for assignment with the U. S. Army in Japan, his dad, Raymond, 57, was rushed to Hollywood Presbyterian Hospital facing surgery calling for amputation of the left leg below the knee—the aftermath of a diabetes affliction.

Henry was needed at home to keep the family investment alive. Contacting the Red Cross, Mrs. Rose got the ball rolling for an emergency furlough for her son. Red Cross workers confirmed the physician's declaration that Henry was the sole support of the family, and his furlough was granted. When complications kept his dad in the hospital and then in a wheelchair the furlough was extended with Red Cross assisting in the procedure.

Henry's dad faces still more hospitalization as plastic surgery will be necessary to prepare for the artificial leg he will be wearing the rest of his life.

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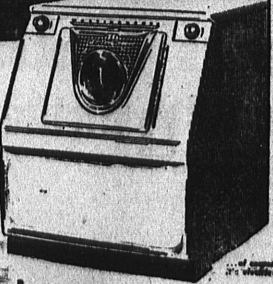
