CSPE Observes Engineer's Week At Dinner Meet

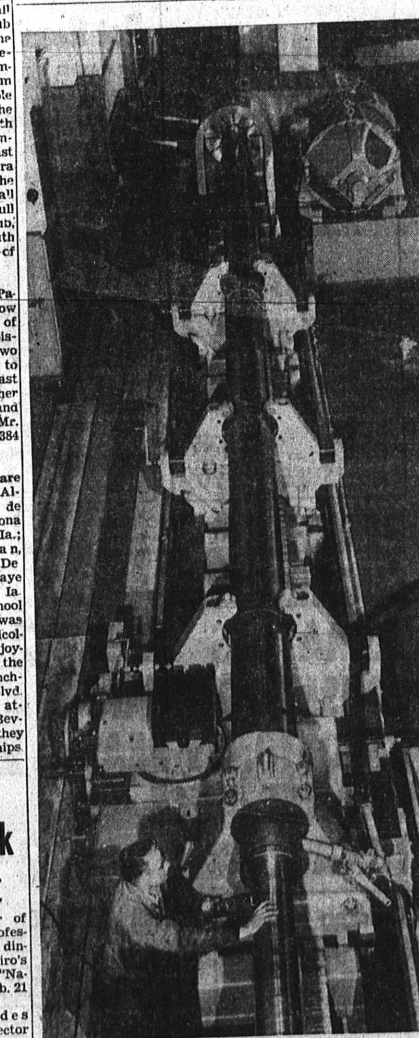
