

Tons of Squid On Order for New Marineland

Marineland of the Pacific this week placed an order for eight tons of freshly caught squid. This will be glazed, frozen and put up in ten-pound cartons and stored in huge refrigerators. These squid are to be fed to the sharks, turtles and other specimens to be contained in the Oceanarium at Portuguese Bend. An 8-ton supply will last approximately eight weeks on a full feeding program. Prior to the opening of Marineland on June 1, the specimens collected at this time will be maintained in holding tanks or receivers in the Los Angeles Harbor.

Salvation Army Seeks Clothing, Other Donations

The Salvation Army Social Service Center serving this area is seeking donations of winter clothing and other articles to fill a pressing two-fold need. Brigadier Ranson D. Gifford said this week.

Materials contributed by local residents first will bring new hope to homeless and handicapped men by providing an occupational therapy program.

The articles are refurbished in the center's workshops, making possible a social rehabilitation program which aids hundreds of needy men.

All refurbished articles are made available to families in low-income brackets.

Gifford, district manager, pointed out that all proceeds from the sale of salvage items, above actual operating costs, are returned in the form of cash grants to the unfortunate men who daily through the center seeking help. "The Salvation Army," he said, "is a strictly no profit organization dedicated to helping people."

Castoff articles donated last year provided thousands of hours of occupational therapy, meals, lodgings and financial aid to needy and handicapped persons, he continued.

He reported that in addition to winter clothing, the center needs shoes, furniture, bedding, dishes, toys, stoves, radios, appliances, bric-a-brac, bicycles, tricycles, rugs and miscellaneous articles.
