

Civic, Company Officials to Hail Goodyear Opening

Water Districts To Talk Over Delivery Quirks

Water delivery problems that may arise this summer because of the delay in constructing the Inglewood lateral pipe line will be discussed by representatives of the West Basin Municipal Water District and the Water Problems Committee of the Metropolitan Water District on Tuesday, Mar. 23.

Originally, it was hoped the line would be completed during the spring of this year to deliver Metropolitan water to Inglewood, adjacent county territory, and Hawthorne. New water producing facilities, however, have not yet been provided to meet demands of increased growth and development.

A water exchange agreement with agencies now having access to the Metropolitan supply may be necessary to insure adequate deliveries this summer for the area eventually to be served from the Inglewood lateral, West Basin officials said.

The West Basin barrier is continuing under full operation with eight injection wells operating. During the past 12 months, a total of 2410 acre feet of fresh water has been injected and pressure levels between the wells have stabilized at approximately 2.8 feet above level.

The inland advance of the fresh water front from the central portion of the recharge line is evident at distances over 1000 feet.

The West Basin District will need additional funds to operate until June 30, officials reported. The original amount of \$33,499.53, raised by contributions and special assessments of Association members, will be needed to complete the project in operation during the next four months.

Annexation of Culver City and adjacent county territory to the Metropolitan Water District is still being considered. The total assessed value of the proposed annexation is \$16,824,80, three months barrier water costs, leaving a balance of \$16,664.73. With an average monthly water charge of \$6000, it is estimated that contributions totaling \$1,236.27 will be needed to keep the project in operation during the next four months.

New Torrance Boulevard Store to Open Friday

Civic officials and representatives of the Goodyear Tire and Rubber Company will officiate at ceremonies opening the firm's new store in Torrance, the office of Dent W. Sanford, vice-president of Goodyear California, announced today.

Grand opening will take place March 19 and 20. The store, located at 2026 Torrance Blvd., was designed by the architectural division of Goodyear's real estate department and built at a cost of \$50,000 by the H. Kaplan Construction Company. Sales, service and storage space will cover 7000 square feet. Another 12,000 square feet have been reserved for parking area.

The store will carry Goodyear auto, truck and tractor tires, and automotive accessories. In addition, it will also handle re-

frigerators, ranges, washing machines, television sets, and complete lines of small electrical appliances, household hardware and toys.

Tire, brake, battery and wheel alignment services will be provided. A specially equipped truck will handle road service.

Store manager Ed Mauldin has been employed by Goodyear for three years. He was budget manager at the San Bernardino outlet and later budget supervisor for the Southern California district before being assigned to manage the Torrance store.

Other store officials will be Jim Maxwell, office manager; Ray Creel, budget manager; Fred Redd, service manager, and Ken Bancroft, brake man.

Kauffman to Construct New 2000 Home Tract

New Homes To Occupy Famous Land

Some 2000 moderately-priced homes for veterans will be built by the Milton Kauffman Construction Corp. on a large tract of land near the corner of Hawthorne Blvd. and 190th St., a part of the original Dominguez land grant given in 1784, Milton Kauffman, company president, announced this week.

"These homes, he said, will take care of 'the crying need for good housing within easy commuting distance of the rapidly-growing Southwest area industrial plants.'"

The new community will be known as Southwest Park, and the completed program will represent an outlay of approximately \$30,000,000, Kauffman said. Plans for the area include public parks, schools, and shopping centers. A school site already has been sold to the Torrance School District, Kauffman said.

Buyers of the Kauffman homes will be the first owners of the property since the original land grant, for this property, like many other thousands of acres, has remained in the Dominguez family for more than 150 years. One Juan Dominguez, a soldier of Spain, secured the right to settle the vast domain of 43,000 acres, which includes the areas now occupied by the cities of Torrance, San Pedro, Wilmington, the Palos Verdes Hills, and "considerable land to the north."

Not entirely without significance in California history is the Milton Kauffman organization itself.

Kauffman, its president and founder, has been developing homes in the Los Angeles area since 1906, and is credited by many with the start of several suburban towns. He estimates that his organization has built another \$605 in delivery charges, 10 years in the cities of Hawthorne, Gardena, Norwalk, Lawton, Downey, Bellflower, West Covina, and others, totaling about \$100,000,000.
