Edison Company officials repeatedly have pointed out the danger that lies in flying kites near electric lines, and urge parents to warn their children to fly kites only in safe places. A particularly hazardous practice also is the use of wire or tinsel string instead of the safer cotton kite cord.

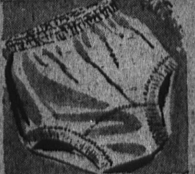

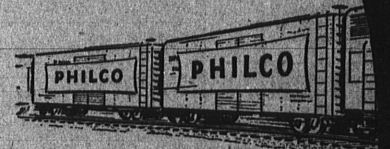
