Halibut Limit Hit
Landing their limits of halibut, cabezons, sculpin and three bull bass last Sunday were Dewey Fix, Bob Franklin, Don Phocis, Paul Husbands, and Timmy and Carl Hammi. Top halibut brought aboard by Paul went 15 lbs. with Timmy following close with his two going 13 and 14 lbs. The sculpin ran between two and four-and-a-half lbs., and the bass topped five lbs. Dewey and Carl were hooked up with whopping halibut, but farmed them.

Ernie Maloy and Johnny Rowe tried opening day of the Yellow-tail Derby in San Diego Saturday, reporting back that only one yellow was taken by the entire fleet. Lots of yellows were seen and as soon as the free bait is cleaned up they are expected to break wide open.
