Battling Conways Make Up, Police Still Angry

Everything was peachy between the Battling Conways today and except for jail cell bars, the two would be back together again.

Unfortunately, the police are not at all pleased with the shenanigans which the warlike couple are accused of being engaged in and are holding them in County Jail until things are settled.

Virginia Conway, 24, said Friday that she was willing to forgive her hubby, Tom, 26, for an alleged beating he gave her on Dec. 20. In like manner, Tom said he had forgiven his spouse for running over him with the family car at 209th and Main Sts. on Oct. 29.

Virginia Admits All... But the police have not forgiven either one. Virginia entered a plea of guilty Thursday in Los Angeles Superior Court to a charge of assault by means of force likely to produce great bodily harm. She originally was charged with assault with intent to commit murder.

The former TV bit player has admitted all and asked for probation. Hearing on her request has been set for April 21. Her husband will be arraigned Thursday and, on the same day, faces sentence on a forgery charge to which he pleaded guilty March 18.

The Conways first hit the local headlines in July of 1953 when Tom refused to sign a complaint against Virginia for allegedly running over him with her car on Torrance Blvd. and Coth Ave. Concerning this peddle, Virginia said "He was so drunk he fell out of the door and I sort of brushed up against him with the car."

Rock Incident Told... Then on Oct. 29, the heralded rock-throwing incident occurred at 209th and Main Sts. The attractive blonde's lawyer had served divorce papers on Tom that day, she said, and she was driving up to her mother's house at 2116 S. Main St. when "up pops Tom."

"He picked up a couple of rocks," she told a Herald reporter, "and pitches them through the windshield of my convertible."

Woman Held On Drunk Driving Charge in Crash

A Torrance woman was booked on a felony drunk driving charge Thursday after her car collided with another car in Redondo Beach, seriously injuring an elderly woman passenger.

Mrs. Edna M. Green, 59, of 1511 Post Av., was arrested by Redondo police at 5:30 p.m. Thursday. She is charged with crashing into the left side of a car being driven by Willis A. Berblinger, 71, and injuring his wife, Mrs. Julia B. Berblinger, 66.

Mrs. Berblinger was taken to Harbor General Hospital in serious condition, suffering from a concussion, possible skull fracture and head lacerations.

Her husband was taken to the hospital but released later for treatment by a private physician. The Berblings are visiting here from Illinois. The accident occurred on Pacific Coast Hwy. at its intersection with N. Juanita Ave.

Flunks Test... Police said Mrs. Green flunked a sobriety test given by a physician shortly after the crash. She at first denied having had a drink but later admitted she had "had a couple," according to police records.

Mrs. Green's car started a left turn and collided with the other auto, which was coming the opposite way, police said. Berblinger said that she did not signal her intent to turn, but turned abruptly, ramming the front end of her car into the left side of his.

She was charged with a felony arising from an accident causing injury to another while driving under the influence of alcohol.
