Recommendations From Youth And Childhood Meeting Told

A list of 21 recommendations came as a result of the Southern California Sixth Conference on Childhood and Youth, held recently in Los Angeles.

1. That there be at least one nurse to every 1200 pupils in all schools.
2. That all agencies support a forthcoming \$1,960,000 bond issue for a new detention facility that will take all boys out of jail.
3. That teen-agers have a voice in the planning for their recreation.
4. That surveys be made to explore moral and spiritual values now held by different age groups in several communities of varying economic-social levels.

Twenty-five public and private organizations and the Community Chest participated in this conference. The three-day meeting which is held every two years is to discuss and act upon the most pressing problems of youth and children.

Delinquency Topic

One of the topics discussed was "How Much Juvenile Delinquency Do We Have in Los Angeles?" by Sgt. Daley Storms, Girls Worker, Juvenile Division, Los Angeles Police Department.

Sgt. Storms revealed that there were less than 1640 children in the Los Angeles area that could be placed in this category.

"We had 10,000 arrests in the Los Angeles area during 1953," she said. "Seventy-four per cent of these were first and only offenders, and their problems were
