Battle for Congress

Just about ninety per cent of the predictions one reads these days-concerning the fall elections—give the Democrats an excel-lent chance to capture control of Congress. Even some Republicans concede the Demo crats this chance, since 1954 is an off-election year. That is, it is not a presidential election year, and in these years, according to all political tradition, the minority party usually gains ground,

In the lower body of Congress, the House the Democratic hold 215 seats and the Repub licans only 219, or four more seats than the minority party. The 435 elections throughout the country in November will accurately re-flect the mood of the voter at the time and place a membership in the House representathe of the mood of the electorate. But there are only thirty-two Senate races this year, since Senate elections are staggered so that only a third of the membership of the upper

body is elected each two years.

And it happens that of the thirty-two Senate terms expiring this year there are only eleven Republican terms expiring. That means that twenty-one Democratic terms are expiring—giving the Republicans a chance to gain in twenty-one states whereas the Democrats

have an opportunity to gain in only eleven

Of the races to fill expiring Democratic terms (twenty-one in all), ten of them are in solid Southern States—and there is no chance of Republican gains. But in another eleven as many as the total number of Republican terms expiring in the Senate—the outcome is not positive.

These Republican opportunities are found in New Mexico (Clinton P. Anderson), Illinois (Paul Douglas), Delaware (Allen Frear), Jowa —(Guy Gillette), Rhode Island (Theodore Green), Minnesota (Hubert Humphrey), Wyoming, (Lester Hunt), Colorado (Edwin Johnson), Oklahoma (Bob Kerr), Montana (James Murray), West Virginia (Matthew Neely).

Of the eleven Republican terms expiring. several are considered in the bag for the G.O.P. Contests which could possibly result in Democratic gains are to be held in the following states (name of Senator whose term expiring in parenthesis. South Dakota (Karl Mundt), Massachusetts (Leverett Saltonstall), New Jersey, (Robert Hendrickson), Nebraska. (Dwight Griswold), Michigan (Homer Ferguson), Idaho (Henry Dworshak), Oregon (Guy Cordon), Kentucky (John Cooper).

Strauss Meets the Press

Rear Admiral Lewis L. Strauss, chairman of the Atomic Energy Commission, was recently exposed to reporters from every section of the country by President Dwight D. Eisenhower. The President took the occasion of a presidential press conference to bring along the AEC chairman and, after the President had answered reporters' questions, he stepped aside for the Admiral.

Reporters had been asking President Eisenhower to have Strauss hold a press conference and give them details on the hydrogen bomb for some weeks. As soon as the opportunity arose—the opportunity having been arranged by the President—reporters were fast to fire questions at the AEC chairman.

Naturaly, one of the first questions was

how powerful hydrogen bombs are likely to get. Chairman Strauss answered by saying the Atomic Energy Commission could build hydrogen bombs to meet the requests of the military services. We left hanging the question whether there was any limit to these fantastic

whether there was any limit to these fantastic new bombs.

The prospect which this latest bomb raises in the minds of all sane humans is a prospect of an effective ban on such weapons by the major powers of the world. So terrible has the destructiveness of atomic weapons become even the Russians appear to be ready to join in ban against their use. It begins to look more and more like the next war—if there is one—will be fought in the conventional manner, without the use of atomic weapons.

U. S. Policy Stiffens

A significant change in U. S. Policy con-cerning Indo-China has taken place in the last two weeks. It all began as far back as Jan-uary when Secretary of State John Foster Dulles made a speech about instant retallation against new Communist aggression.

In the past few weeks the White House has decided to go all-out in trying to win the war in French Indo China. The result has been a clear warning to Red China not to intervene directly in the Indo China struggle. The Chinese have been told, in effect, that the United States would definitely react vigorously to any such action.

President Eisenhower himself has lined up behind this basic policy. General Douglas MacArthur, who conferred with the President recently, is thought to be in favor of it.

With the tough attitude on Indo China also goes an American decision to rule out any possibility of the recognition of Red China at the April 26th meeting in Geneva. Some U. S. allies were hoping Communist China would exhibit more peaceful leanings if western powers considered recognition but the U. S. view is that Red China's continued agistance to Communists fighting the French in Indo China is proof that the opposite is true.

In short, the new U. S. policy is a firmer one than has been evidenced yet by this country. The statements of Secretary Dulles — about instant and massive retailation — are actually surprisingly bold talk. If his threats are backed up, the United States almost seems committed to the use of major forces and perhaps new weapons, to counter any new aggression from the Communist world.

In other words, to sum it up, the United States is embarked on a bold policy in Indo China, administrative leaders no doubt being convinced this is the only policy the Chinese

described the opening session f hearings before a Senate ubcommittee on banking and subcommittee on banking and finance, as that subcommittee proceeded toward consideration of four separate bills designed for restoration of trading in gold, and a gold coin standard with a fully redeemable currency system. Before going further into the testimony of-

rency system. Before going further into the testimony offered the subcommittee, the nature of the bills under consideration should be described.

A bill "To permit the free marketing of newly mined gold," designated as S. 2384, was introduced in the first session of the 83rd Congress by Senator James E. Murray (D. Mont.). This short and concise bill states; "That, not withstanding the provisions of any other law of Executive order or regulation to the contrary, newly mined gold produced after the enactment of this Act within the United States or its Territories or insular possesions may be acquired, purchased, sold, melted or treated, held in custody, transported, or earmarked by any person or Government instrumentality without penalty or restriction."

McCARRAN BILLS: A sectored bill introduced in the first

McCarran Bill.I.S: A second bill introduced in the first session of the 83rd Congress by Senator Pat McCarran (D. New), known as S. 13, reads substantially as folows: "That, notwithstanding any law or Executive order, gold in any form, mined subsequent to the enactment of this Act within the United States, its Territories and possessions, including Alaska, may be bought, held, sold, or traded upon the open market within the United States, its Territories and possessions, including Alaska, for any purpose whatsoever, and may be exported without the imposition of duties, excise taxes, the requirement of licenses, permits, or any restrictions whatsoever,"

This bill provides further that: "Gold imported into the United States after the effective date of this Act may be held, bought, sold, or traded upon the open market within the United States, its Territories and possessions, including Alaska, for any purpose whatsoever, and may be exported without the imposition of duties, excise taxes, the requirement of license, permits, or any restrictions whatsoever."

Senator McCarran also h as introduced in the first session of the 33rd Congress another bill: "To establish a sound, honest, and dependable monetary system which will maintain and protect the solvency and integrity of the people's money and the solvency and integrity of the people's money and the solvency and integrity of the redemption of our currency in gold and/or silver, at face value, on demand, and for other purposes."

This bill, designated as S. 2514, provides first, for a free and open market in gold substantially the same as called for in the McCarran bill \$1.3. It provides further that after sufficient time has clapsed: "The price of gold shall be fixed by the Congress where it accurately reflects the depreciation that has taken place in the United States dollar since

prices of gold and silver so determined shall remain fixed determined shall remain fixed and constant unless and united hanged by Act of Congress." After this free trading period. has passed and the weights of gold and silver coins have been established, then: "The right to redeem United States currency in gold or silver at face value, on demand (in coin), is hereby restored."

BRIDGES BILL: A fourth bill considerably more detailed and explicit was introduced by Senator Styles Bridges (R. N.H.) to be cited as "The Gold Redemption Act of 1954." This bill is further identified as S. 2332. It differs from the other three bills in that it does not provide for a free market in gold, which might lead to further inflation; but does provide re inflation; but does provide er inflation; but does provide for full redeemability with the weight of the gold dollar to remain as it is now fixed by law at 1/35 of an ounce of gold 9/10 fine.
Section 2 of this bill states:

"It is hereby declared to be
the policy of the Congress,
with a view to strengthening
confidence in the United States
dollar and minimizing inflationary pressure, and in order to
protect holders of savings
bonds—including Federal an d
private obligations—owners of
savings deposits and insurance
policles, and persons dependent
upon pensions or fixed salaries
or wages from the effects of
inflation, to return the currency of the United States to
the gold standard and thereby
restore to American citizens
the gold convertibility privilege
(now) enjoyed by foreign holders of United States (currency)
dollars."

PROTECTIVE MEASURES:

PROTECTIVE MEASURES:
The Bridges Bill finally provides that: "The President shall not suspend payment in gold on any obligation heretofore or hereafter entered into except as specifically authorized by Act of Congress. Section 16 of the Federal Reserve Act is amended by adding at the end thereof the following new paragraph: For the purposes of this section. Treasury currency, except that in process of retirement, and consisting of gold, gold certificates, silver and minor coins, silver certificates, and United States notes shall be counted as part of the lawful money for reserves against deposits in Federal Reserve banks.' (And) the following are hereby repealed... all provisions of law authorizing the President to alter the size, weight, or fineness of gold and silver coins; and all laws or parts thereof which are inconsistent with the provisions of this Act." The Bridges Bill provides for full redeemability to become effective one year after the date of enactment.
