500-Home Development in Hills Above High Started by G & G

Excavating and grading operations by the G&G Construction Co., Inc., of Manhattan Beach on the balance of the property comprising the historic Weston Ranch in Torrance, mark the opening of a new residential district for the City of Torrance.

The 110-acre site, once a part of an extensive agricultural ranch founded in 1880 by Ben Weston, will be subdivided into tracts containing more than 500 homes and view lots valued at approximately \$7,000,000.

The property was purchased in December of 1953 from Sarah P. Weston, Gladys N. Weston Wheeler, Dorothea R. Weston and Sally W. Somers, and since the detailed planning has gone into making this subdivision one of the most attractive and colorful in the area.

The land is located south of Pacific Coast Hwy. east of Gresham Blvd. and is the highest point of elevation in the district.

Homes and lots in this new location will command extraordinary views of the entire Torrance, Palos Verdes, and Rolling Hills area, and of the Pacific Ocean looking south toward San Pedro and Long Beach.

It is expected that large lots ranging from 6500 square feet will be incorporated into the tract, and curved streets and imaginative planning will result in a new community of unusual distinction.

Preliminary plans call for the construction of three and four bedroom homes priced from \$11,500 to \$13,000. Typical homes will have such features as 1 1/2 baths, fireplaces, electric garbage disposals, patio area, and landscaped lots.

A certain number of choice view lots will be sold improved. Many of the homes will have custom-installed Thermador electric ranges, ovens, and broilers.

The G&G Construction Co., Inc., has already constructed more than 700 homes in the Torrance area and has an outstanding record for quality-built homes.

Henry C. Griswold, president, and Paul E. Griffin, vice-president, state the first foundations will be poured within 30 days, and it is anticipated that the first homes will be ready for occupancy in four months.

City Asked to Join Forces in Clean Up

It's Spring housecleaning time in America and communities across the nation this month are proclaiming "Clean-up Week" in order to rejuvenate their towns, make them healthier, safer from fire and more attractive places in which to live.

Mayor Nicholas Drahe has proclaimed this week "Clean-up" time in Torrance. City crews will make special efforts this week to remove piles of rubbish and leftovers resulting from industry on the parts of each individual housewife.

The Torrance Police Department has issued a warning to motorists that the 48 hour parking limit set by City Ordinance No. 624 is being enforced. Cars that are left sitting on the street for more than 48 hours will be impounded.

This ordinance is designed to remove unsightly "junkers" cars that are being worked on in the street or are out of running order.

Leaving Pittsburgh on a company-owned plane, he checked up on the company's stores in Texas, Louisiana, and Mississippi, and studied the possibility of setting up some more.

Although McKinney met a number of the company's good customers, the conversation was largely of a social nature, with no effort to sell anything. The article explains that the oil business is a highly personalized one in which much is accomplished just by keeping on friendly terms with customers and by giving them prompt service when needed.
