After the students arrive, don't overwhelm with "Now here in America we do it like this." Give them a America we do it like this." Give them a chance to say "In our country we do it another way.'

Don't stress what a wonderful opportunity

Don't stress what a wonderful opportunity it is for them to be here. Most people in foreign lands already have the idea that America is some kind of second heaven.

Instead, think what an opportunity it is for you to have them here. You'll be able to learn first-hand about other nations and their people, instead of reading about them.

If this two-way attitude prevails, not only will the students be able to take something back to their own people, but they will leave something here with us which will add immeasurably to international understanding. Remember this when you give your dollar or dollars to AFSIS. Whether you learn nothing, a little, or a lot is strictly up to you.

Federal Road Help Boosted

Conferees from both the Senate and House tion of highways has become a major problem lave agreed to an increase in Federal aid for lighway construction from \$652,500,000 to 1966,000,000. This is a first step in the right have agreed to an increase in Federal aid for highway construction from \$652,500,000 to \$966,000,000. This is a first step in the right direction of more Federal money for highways, and will be readily approved by most of the

and will be leading to country's voters.

It has long been claimed that the Federal government has been using too much highway-produced revenue for purposes other than construction and maintenance of a decent system struction and maintenance of a decent system of highways. While this revenue totals billions of dollars, in the past the Federal Government has been able to spend only a little over a half a billion dollars on the nation's roads. Since the end of World War II, in 1945, the number of vehicles on the roads has increased so rapidly that over-crowding and deteriora-

first-class road system.

House and Senate conferees have accepted this advice, to some extent, in increasing the annual appropriation for Federal highways to almost a billion dollars. Although this is a major increase, compared with the expenditure appropriated for this purpose last year, many say this figure will have to be increased considerably, in the next year or two.

The Federal Government will probably have to spend as much as two or three billion dollars on roads in coming years, and if it were not for heavy defense outlays at present, there would be no justification for not spending that amount at the present time.

A Retaliatory Defense

Defense Secretary Charles E. Wilson, whose outspoken comments sometimes surprise reporters, told members of the House Appropriations committee ations committee recently that the United States is relatively secure against atomic at-

States is relatively secure against atomic at-tacks from Russia. Mr. Wilson said the securi-ty stemmed from this country's readiness to retailate with a massive attack of its own. Wilson—like predecessors in the Defense Department—is relying mainly on the retail-atory power of the United States Air Force to prevent Russian aggression. The fact that this country has built and is now operating bases all over the world, in semi-circle almost surrounding Russia, adds to the possibility

We have long believed that the greatest anger to this country's security lies in get-ing ensnared in a major land war, in Asia or elsewhere, where Communist masses could be used against United States troops fighting thousands of miles from home, and where the U.S. troops would not be supported by this country's superiority in atomic and hydrogen

country's superiority in atomic and hydrogen weapons.

The manpower of our allies is almost a prerequisite for successfully conducting a conventional war against Communist nations and it is for this reason that the United States must have allies. Our far-flung bases and our atomic and hydrogen weapons may prevent surprise attacks, but only the cooperation of our allies can enable us to successfully conclude another war without bleeding the country's manpower white.

Large Scale Maneuvers

The Army and Air Force are completing Exercise Flash Burn—one of the largest peace time maneuvers ever staged in this country—in North Carolina, South Carolina and Virginia. In the maneuvers some of the Army's latest drops ever to be staged were featured. The Air Force, simulating combat conditions, flew in fighter groups from as far West as the State of Washington, and set them up on fields which were, only a few weeks before, completely abandoned.

The Army used, for the first time in maneuvers, its artillery rocket "Honest John." The guided missle and atomic cannon were also used, as well as tactical television. The Air Force employed Douglas B:124 Globemasters, Fairchild C-119 Flying Boxcars and many other large aircraft to bring in field equipment.

The Army and Air Force are completing Force flew in jeeps and other heavy equipment used by ground crews and completely esta-blished the air base with aerial delivery of equipment and supplies. Following the South Atlantic States man-cuvers, another maneuver—designed to test

Most of our tobacco in the United States comes from the South. It's one of the South's biggest money assets. Some of the Southern states would be reduced to almost poverty without tobacco. Atlanta is the heart of the South and the hub of the tobacco market. In Atlanta the Southern Medical Association held its annual convention. Southern doctors had more to say about tobacco than about anything else, because of the recent controversies between tobacco companies and cancer-researchers on the subject of lung cancer and its connection with tobacco.

What some Southern doctors had to say about the harmful effects shocked the "tobacco auctioneers." It took a lot of courage for the doctors to say it in the South. If it were not for their desire to "tet the youth of America know the truth about tobacco, to offset the false claims made by tobacco advertising." they might never have tackled this ticklish subject in Atlanta. Financially they certainly would have been better off. If they avoided the subject altogether. Everyone in the tobacco business in the South would have liked them better if they had said nothing. But for the doctors to state: "All tobacco in a ny form, filter or no filter, is not good for the body. It is irritating to throat, lungs, membranes. . the very nature of the tobacco plant, chemically irritates and dries the membranes of the respiratory tract and interferes with their normal functions". well, it took a kind of courage that's rare, refreshing and self-rewarding. 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controversial question of lung cancer and tobacco. My advice to smokers is to cut down. To the young: do not smoke. To women: it is more harmful for you than men, is addition to its unpleasant effects on your breath." When asked a bout moderation is smoking, Dr. Cameron said: "If you must smoke, cut it down to less than 8 cigarettes per day."

Independent Medical Opinion Former U. S. Surgeon General Evarts A. Graham said: "Dr. Ernest L. Wynder and I have reproduced cancer experimentally in mice by using merely the tars from tobacco smoke and then using the tobacco alone. This shows conclusively that there is something in cigarette smoke, from all its sources, which can produce encer. This is no longer a theory. Our experiments have proved it beyond any doubt." Another foremost U. S. surgeon, Dr. Alton Ochsner, predicted that "at the rate people are smoking today, by 1970 one out of every ten will develop lung cancer."

The British Medical Journal says: "Among 200 lung cancer patients 95.5 per cent we reme and women with long histories of heavy cigarette smoking."

Prominent doctors are cooperating with tobacco companies

Prominent doctors are cooperating with tobacco companies in research to isolate all causative agents in tobacco for the purpose of removing them. Dr. Evarts A. Graham had this to say in a recent medical paper: "The digarette companies are spending millions in the newspapers, radio and TV, trying to induce more cigarette smoking, particularly a mong young men and women ... many of whom will become victims of cancer of the lung twenty years from now. It is certainly the moral obligation and common sense on the part of the eigarette manufacturers aboratories."

Medical experts are definite in their opinion that the cancer-inducing agencies in a cigarette are not confined to nicotine, but to "several" other factors as well. Life insurance statisties indicate that "the death rate among smokers is 39 per 1000 for non-smokers, all other things being equal."

Religious Policy

On March 7, 1954 a small and seemingly insignificant release (AP) appeared, It read:
"Dr. Trueblood, head of the philosophy department of Bralam College at Richmond, Ind.," is to become chief of religious policy for the U. S. Information Agency, officials said today."
This appointment raises some serious questions: Does the creation of the office of "Chief of Religious Policy" set aside "principles of religious equality, toleration, and liberty, set forth in the Constitution, Bill of Rights, and the Declaration of Independence?" Twelve elergymen who called in the office of the U. S. Information Agency on April 13 from the American Council of Christian Churches believe it does. They presented a petition and a brief objecting to its establishment. In talking to the elergymen Dr. Trublood announced, "I pledge that I will be fair in dealing with your group."

"The very fact that he is in a position to make such a statement," reported Dr. McIntre, "was the reason the y were opposing the position."

requested Dr. Trueblood's removal from office immediately, not only on their objection to such an office, but to its lack of confidence in Dr. Trueblood, an avowed pacifist, who ha a shown sympathy to some Marcian ideals and has published books on the subject.

The brief concluded: If the U. S. Government is going to continue the business of propagandizing the world, she should report to the world the freedom and diversity, and the independence of religious groups and opinions within the United States and let it rest at that alone! And such does not require the council, advice, or philosophy of any religious expert. To attempt to blend and adjust religious opinions can only stir controversies. We believe that such a position in the office of the U. S. Information Agency is inminical to the cause of religious freedom and the best interests of the U. S. A., and we therefore respectfully submit that it be discontinued. We do not have confidence in Dr. Trueblood for any such calling."

We too would like to see more personal religion and fewer experts.
